Brandeis National Committee History

Located in Waltham, Massachusetts, Brandeis University is ranked in the top tier of universities in the coun-

try. Founded in 1948 and named for the late Justice Louis Dembitz Brandeis of the U.S. Supreme Court, it is the only nonsectarian, Jewish-founded university in the country, known for its academic excellence and ideals of social justice. At the same time as Brandeis founding, eight women from Boston,

all leaders in the community, were asked to help in supporting this new university. They were given the task of building on the collection of 2,000 books in the Library, which was housed in a converted horse stable. The dedication and perseverance of these women, who now called themselves the National Women's Committee continues today, sixty-one years later, as the Brandeis National Committee. With over 70 chapters nationwide and over 39,000 members, BNC is one of the largest and most successful "friends of a library organizations in the world. Over the years, we have placed over one million books in the Brandeis libraries, and raised over \$100 million for Brandeis University and its libraries, scholarships and research. Brandeis University has become one of the youngest private research universities, with ground-breaking exploration in neurodegenerative and age-related diseases.

Our Conejo Valley Chapter is proud to be a part of this wonderful endeavor. The funds we raise from our events and study groups help to support the development and expansion of Brandeis's Libraries. They are able to purchase books and research journals, restore and preserve books and film, develop information technology, and hire student work assistants. While most of us did not attend Brandeis University or have never visited, we are dedicated supporters to a university that prides itself in bringing together many people of different ethnic, religious and cultural backgrounds.



CIO report

Brandeis Pre-Med Track Has Long, Successful History

Brandeis students have long traveled the road from liberal arts to the field of medicine. "Brandeis students come here because of our rigorous science program and our success in preparing students for medical school," says Judith Hudson, director of prehealth advising. "Since medical schools also look for well-rounded applicants, our students are very appealing because they have demonstrated a commitment to community service and the experimental learning that comes from clinical volunteering.

About 100 students a year apply to health professions schools, including dental and veterinary programs. Many Brandeis graduates now working in medical fields attribute their success to basic science research. Robert Friedlander, Class of "87 and now a professor and chairman of neurosurgery at the University of Pittsburgh, says, "If you have the right research mentor and advisors, you learn what's an important question, how to ask it, how to develop the experiment to answer the question and how to make sure that you have the right controls to get the right answers.

"Dean of Arts and Sciences Susan Birren says, "Having lab experience has not only prepared students for medical school, but informed them what their goals were and how to achieve them...that is one of the advantages of the basic science education, particularly the opportunity to work in a basic science laboratory.

BOOKS 'N BRUNCH Our sixth annual Books 'n Brunch was held on Wednesday, March 28th at our favorite venue, North Ranch Country Club. Among the nearly 200 guests, we were honored to host BNC Past National Vice President, Laura Benedon, Western Region Co-President Sue Karp from the Phoenix Chapter and Western Region Co-President Phyllis Perkal from the San Dieguito Chapter. In fact, our Books "n Brunch has enjoyed such a good reputation that we had several book clubs in the community attend as groups. In addition to a fabulous buffet brunch, we were thoroughly entertained by three wonderful authors. M. J. Lord, author of The Accidental Feminist, How Elizabeth Taylor Raised our Consciousness and We Were Too Distracted By Her Beauty to Notice, showed film clips from some of Ms Taylor's movies in which she introduced us to feminist ideas and really influenced our thinking about women's roles in society. It was a thoroughly entertaining presentation. (Ms Lord filled in for author Cara Black who was unable to appear due to illaness.) Rabbi Naomi Levy gave a most inspirational speech relating to her book, Hope Will Find You, as she related the events surrounding her young daughter's illness and described with humor and honesty how she came through a time of uncertainty and fear and learned how to stop waiting for life to begin. Her message was most thought-provoking and had meaning for many of us. Best-selling author Lisa See made her second appearance before our membership (she first appeared at our Membership Luncheon in 2005) and drew a parallel between the characters in her books, Shanghai Girls and Dreams of Joy and the relationships between mothers and daughters both past and present. For those of us whose daughters were in attendance, Ms See's presentation had special meaning. We all had fun with a naming contest in which Sheila Anderson won the right to have a character named for her in an upcoming mystery novel by author Cara Black (more on this in a future newsletter). Everyone also stocked up on gift certificates to Brent's Deli with a portion of the proceeds returning to the chapter. Not only did we all enjoy ourselves immensely, but the day was a huge success financially. We raised 45% more for Brandeis' Sustaining the Mind Fund than we raised the previous year. A special thanks to everyone on the Fundraising Committee and all our chapter volunteers who worked so hard to make this event a success. You won't want to miss the Fall Boutique and Membership Luncheon on September 11, 2012 again at North Ranch Country Club. Plans are currently underway.
