We have two very exciting guest authors for our annual Books ' N Brunch, which will be held at North Ranch Country Club.


FRANCES DINKELSPIEL, author of "TOWERS OF GOLD: HOW ONE JEWISH IMMIGRANT NAMED ISAIAS HELLMAN CREATED CALIFORNIA"
"Towers of Gold." is a vivid portrait of the financier who changed California forever. Isaias Hellman was one of the most influential individuals in the history of early California. Integral to the expansion of Wells Fargo Bank, the establishment of the University of Southern California and financing of the oil industry, Hellman's meteoric rise from store clerk to the upper echelons of society is chronicled in this meticulously researched biography.


Upon arriving in Los Angeles at the age of sixteen, Hellman discovered a town of mostly adobe buildings and home to fewer than 4400 people. Within 10 years, he founded the city's first bank which eventually turned him into one of the wealthiest men in California. We are taken on a journey from early Los Angeles, as it emerged into a bustling metropolis, to the birth of the Southern Pacific railway line, to the creation of major financial centers in San Francisco.
 ALICE RENE, author of "BECOMING ALICE" A Memoir. The Nazi's are marching down the streets of Vienna and six year old Ilsa does not understand the threat to her Jewish family. Follow their harrowing escape which finally ends in Portland, Oregon. Although the family is safe at last, author Alice Rene writes about the emotional impact of Nazi tyranny on a young child and how it affected her personally.

Ilsa is ashamed of being different. The antics of an outrageous aunt and uncle, though comical, only add to her humiliation. Changing her name to Alice does not alter her
 feelings of isolation. She realizes she must somehow make peace with her history and identity. "Becoming Alice" relates Alice's triumph over adversity, identity crisis and the debilitating power of family ties.

Pesach (Passover): March 29 - April 6, 2010—Festival Of Freedom!


The Seder Plate
Ingredients and Order of Placement
Preparing the Seder plate requires several hours of work. It is advisable to get other members of the house to help so that the work will be completed before the Seder begins. It is best to prepare all the seder foods before the onset of the Holiday in order to avoid halachic questions.

The special foods we eat on Passover are also food for thought. Every item on the Seder plate abounds in meaning and allusion. The Seder plate has six items on it, arranged in a special order. The plate is placed on top of the covering of the three matzot and is placed in front of the head of the household.

The foods of the Seder plate are listed below, with the reason each is included, the method of preparing it, and its role in the Seder meal.

The Shank Bone
A piece of roasted meat represents the lamb that was the special Paschal sacrifice on the eve of the exodus from Egypt, and annually, on the afternoon before Passover, in the Holy Temple...
The Egg
A hard-boiled egg represents the holiday offering brought in the days of the Holy Temple. The meat of this animal constituted the main part of the Passover meal...

## The Bitter Herbs

Bitter herbs (maror) remind us of the bitterness of the slavery of our forefathers in Egypt. Fresh grated horseradish, romaine lettuce, and endive are the most common choices...

## The Paste

A mixture of apples, nuts and wine which resembles the mortar and brick made by the Jews when they toiled for Pharaoh...

## The Vegetable

A non-bitter root vegetable alludes to the back-breaking work of the Jews as slaves. The Hebrew letters of karpas can be arranged to spell "Perach Samech"...

## The Lettuce

The lettuce symbolizes the bitter enslavement of our fathers in Egypt. The leaves of Romaine lettuce are not bitter, but the stem, when left to grow in the ground, turns hard and bitter...
