
LISA SEE, author of Dreams of Joy

Lisa See, author of the critically-acclaimed international bestseller, Snow Flower and the Secret Fan (2005), has always been intrigued by stories that have been lost, forgotten, or deliberately covered up, whether in the past or happening right now in the world today. Her 2011 book, Dreams of Joy, completes the circle she began in Shanghai Girls. The book uses Mao's China as the background, but the story focuses on the change and growth of her main characters - Pearl, Joy, Z.G., and May. Dreams of Joy debuted as #1 in the New York Times list of best selling fiction.






CARA BLACK, author of the Aimée Leduc Investigation Series Cara Black's nationally bestselling and award nominated mystery novels track detective Aimée Leduc and have been translated in 5 languages. RABBI NAOMI LEVY, author of Hope Will Find You

Naomi Levy is an American rabbi, author and speaker. In 1989, she became the first female Conservative rabbi to head a pulpit on the West Coast. Rabbi Levy has been listed many times as one of the 50 most influential rabbis in the nation by Newsweek Magazine. Her first book, To Begin Again (1998) discusses recovery from suffering and tragedy and relates her own loss when her father was murdered in an armed robbery when she was 15. In 2004 she founded Nashuva, a spiritual outreach service for Jews turned off to traditional Jewish service. In 2010 she published her third book, Hope Will Find You: My Search for the Wisdom to Stop Waiting and Start Living



which deals with what happened after her daughter was diagnosed with a serious disease.



CIO REPORT - Harriet Maran: Israeli Women Still Struggle with Segregation

Requiring women to sit in the back of public buses in Israel is just one of a wide range of denigrating restrictions proposed in the name of religion, speakers told an overflow crowd at a program in Wasserman Cinematique.

Attempts have been made to create separate sidewalks, medical waiting rooms and cashiers for women in Israel, said Boston University School of Law professor Pnina Lahav. In fact, Lahav told of a recent medical symposium on infertility, where doctors - all malegot together to discuss the female body, she said, "but pretend women have nothing to do with it".

Women won their court battle against bus segregation, but the courts noted that people can not, be stopped from voluntarily segregating, and so social pressure and harassment continues.

Hopeful for the future of women's rights in religion, Lahav concluded "Progress and Judaism are not like oil and water. On the contrary, they are like milk and honey."

In addition to the Homegirl Café and the Homeboy Bakery there is silk-screens and embroidery, merchandise made by members is sold on the premises and can be ordered, an active component is their Homegrown mini farm that not only helps supply the dining facility, they sell in

Farmer's Markets in many locations in Los Angeles.

All of Homeboy Industries is funded purely on donations and not only the services you see are available to give people at risk a second chance, they are also offered, temporary housing, urgent medical, mental health and dental care, child care, emergency car repairs, bus and train tokens and vouchers, tattoo removal, food and clothing for job interviews and to create a new image of the person. Education is a strategic part of the recovery program. Academic classes, Life Skills, Substance Abuse, Support groups, Extracurricular classes and Work Readiness classes are offered everyday. Some are elective and some are mandatory. Another very important part of the work at Homeboy is job training and job referrals.



All and all, the day spent at Homeboy Industries was enlightening and important! Donations are appreciated. Go for a visit. Eat lunch. Buy some bread and pastries and most of all talk with people in the facility. Better yet, if you know when you will be there, ask for a private tour. The people at Homeboy Industries are proud to share their accomplishments (January 12, 2012).
